ITEC Conference 2024

The 29th Annual Inter-Tribal Environmental Council Conference was held July 23-24, 2024, at the Hard Rock Hotel in Catoosa, Oklahoma. The General Assembly opened with the presentation of colors being posted by the Cherokee Nation Color Guard and a performance by the Cherokee National Youth Choir. Opening plenary sessions focused on a Documentary Screening and Panel discussion on the video "Meet ME at the Creek".. The annual ITEC meeting was



also held before lunch on the opening day. Afternoon sessions were on PFA, Indoor Air Quality, Rainwater Harvesting, Orphaned Wells and Climate Resilience.

Wednesday was a full day of sessions covering a wide variety of Environment topics. There were 18 sessions with speakers in each session delivering information on current environmental topics.



There were approximately 190 attendees which included representatives from the Environmental Protection Agency, Region 6 Tribes, various tribal organizations, environmental consultants and environmental organizations. Equipment manufacturers and other vendors also displayed their products

and services at this year's ITEC Conference.

The Regional Tribal Operations Committee meetings were held July 10-11, 2024 at the Route 66 Casino in Albuquerque, New Mexico. The Tribal Caucus was held on July 10th and the full RTOC on July 11, 2024. Approximately 30 Tribes and EPA representatives attended. Topics of discussion included: LANL, Bishops Lodge Water Treatment Plant Update, Mescalero Apache update, AEIO update, Santa Clara Flooding Update and a presentation from the New Mexico Environmental Department. Dr. Nance EPA Region 6 Director attended in person and AIEO representatives attended by phone.

ITEC Training: Radon What is it?

On September 12, 2024 ITEC held a "Radon What is it" Training. There were 15 participants from Cherokee Nation, Muscogee Nation, Kaw Nation, and Apache Tribe. The training consisted of classroom discussions on the components of Radon testing, mitigation and certification. Also, the students visited a local home that had an active radon mitigation system installed to see how the process works.

National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week

National Lead Poisoning Prevention Week (NLPPW) is October 20th-26th. October is also Children's Health Month! This is an important time to bring together communities and organizations to reduce childhood exposure to lead, and other toxins and environmental factors, by increasing lead poisoning awareness. The message of 2024 is "Bright futures begin lead free," because our future depends on today's children.



Lead can be present in paint, dust, soil, water, and aged foundations; this means that ingestion by mouth or breath is made easier in these areas. This exposure can cause delayed development, lower IQ and learning issues, and damage to the entire nervous system. All of this results in behavioral and physical problems, which is why public health actions are necessary for children with lead levels in their blood.

Each community deserves to be free of hazardous chemicals and matter, and this is possible with proper education of lead ex-

posure, methods of protection, childhood blood tests, and professional home tests.

EPA has developed outreach materials including an information kit with talking points, facts about lead and lead exposure, event ideas and planning suggestions. There is also a sample social media package with content ideas, sample posts and graphics centered around the three key messages above.

These resources can be adapted to reach many audiences, including parents, grandparents, caregivers, contractors, hardware stores, trade associations and media outlets. They are also designed so NLPPW can be incorporated into activities planned for Children's Health Month, which is also observed in October.
