

The Regional Tribal Operations Committee meetings were held July 9-10, 2025 at the Laguna Pueblo in Albuquerque, New Mexico. There were 71 in attendance for the Tribal Caucus and 89 for the RTOC meeting from EPA and 37 Tribes and Pueblos from throughout Region 6. Topics of discusincluded: sion LANL, NEPA Update, SAFETEA,

NTC and TPPC removal EPA Proposals, Tar Creek Apprenticeship Program, and Tribal Leaders Concerns and remarks. Meetings also included OITA/AEIO Updates, NTOC Updates and EPA Region 6 Division Reports from staff. The meetings ended with action item updates and scheduling for the fall Caucus/RTOC and the Spring meeting.







Wyandotte Environmental Festival

The Wyandotte Nation Environmental Department hosted its 14^{th} Annual Environmental Festival on May 9, 2025. There were a total of 457 students and 35 teachers in attendance from Wyandotte Public Schools, grades pre $k-8^{th}$ grades.

There were 17 booths, with 32 booth workers, of which 11 were from local tribes. The tribes represented were Eastern Shawnee, Miami, Modoc, Ottawa, Peoria, Quapaw, Seneca Cayuga, and Wyan-

dotte. The remaining 6 booths were from state and community entities, they were OCC, NRCS, GRDA, FWS, Friends of Wildcat Glades, and Communities Unlimited.

There were a total of 25 Wyandotte Nation employee volunteers that helped with registration, shuttling students from the buses, cooking and serving the noon meal that was provided for the booth workers and with clean up afterwards.

The Environmental Department looks forward to this event and for the past 14 years it has continued to grow. The Wyandotte Schools look forward to their students attending and learning about the various environmental issues and concerns from the surrounding area.



Tribal Environmental Summit 2025



Mark Mitchell, Former Pueblo of Tesuque Governor, provided the keynote address. Plenary speakers were Randy Gee EPA Region 6 Tribal Affairs Director and Tabitha Langston National Tribal Operations Committee Chair.

Shelly Lemon, New Mexico Environmental Department, gave an opening presentation on

Water Permitting and Trinal Engagement Opportunities discussing how the Tribes and state will work together on future surface water issues.

There was a full day on Thursday July 10, 2025 that included 12 sessions of speakers on a wide range of environmental topics important to Tribal participants. The final day was completed with a closing plenary session conducted by the EPA Region 6 Office of Tribal Affairs. This session covered topics for Tribal GAP grantees in Region 6.

There were approximately 150 attendees which included representatives from the Environmental Protection Agency, Region 6 Tribes, various tribal organizations, environmental consultants and environmental organizations. Equipment manufacturers also displayed their products and services at this years' Summit..
